An Exclusive Interview With Lowell Tyde

A: It's great if you got one, but, no, you don't. People without them double-up with thos who do, or they rent one. What you DO need is a Coast Gaurd-approved life vest.

Q: Can non-members come on trips?

A: Yeh, but in that case they're on their own as far as arrangements etcetera go. Only members can register for a trip.

A: I dunno. You should know that you'll have some good times, make some new friends, and discover some beautiful places. And soon we'll have t-shirts. You should know to make your checks payable to Hackensack River Canoe Club. And you should know we're serious about all of this.

RIVERS FLOW THROUGH TIME as well as place, and in their course they say much about us. Today's Hackensack speaks of neglect and years of human disrespect. Gone are the white sand beaches, and in their stead is at least a foot of oozing sludge in many places. Gone is the abundance of wildlife which inhabited her and her banks. Gone too is the countless-century-old tradition of canoes on the Hackensack. Almost gone. There is a lesson being told to us, if we stop to listen. The lesson is that when we forget a river - or, worse yet, treat it as a drainage ditch for our refuse - that river in turn will abandon us. Slowly at first, the river and all the life it nurtures will begin to leave our careless culture behind. Long before the European colonization brought an endto their culture, the hand-tooled dugouts of the Lenape graced these waters. Let's shock our friends and neighbors when we say "I'm a Hackensack River Rat!" Let's wave to the cars on the turnpike as they race blindly by the abounding wildlife returning to the meadows. Let's place our faith in the river's recovery, and let us bring the canoe back to her as a sign of our good will.
